Other rescues, all strays, successfully fostered and adopted!



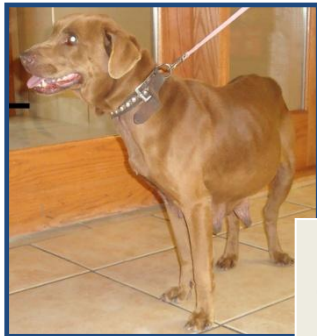
More happy tails, all have been adopted to forever homes!

She had a very nasty gash on her leg with the infection spreading all the way into the muscle. Sara was also covered in older scars from unknown injuries. She obviously has been through a lot of trauma but remains a sweet, friendly but timid girl. You can't help but fall instantly in love with her. She is also heartworm positive and will receive treatment after she recuperates a little more.



Noah staggered up to a local business. He was so weak he could barely stand up. Besides being starved he was suffering from parasites and heartworm disease.



This is Noah now at his wonderful foster home. He's gaining weight and loves playing with his foster playmate. He will undergo his heartworm treatment after he is healthier.

As you can clearly see, For the Love of Strays has already made a profound impact on the lives of many animals in just the short five months since its formation. To continue saving lives and decreasing the stray animal population, we need the support of our community. Our top needs at this time are foster homes and financial help. Heartworm treatment alone costs \$400 and up per dog.

We believe these animals should not be made to suffer anymore. We are here to right the wrongs that have been done to them.
